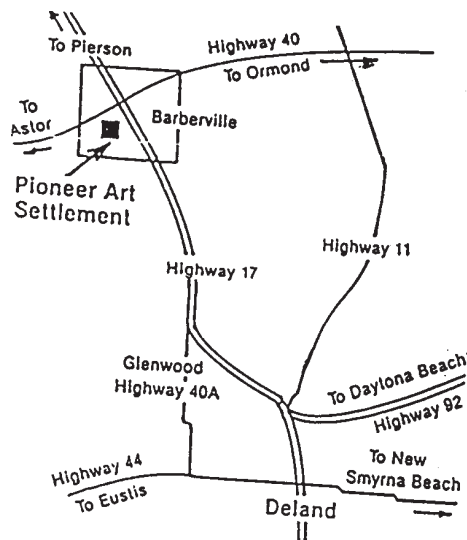

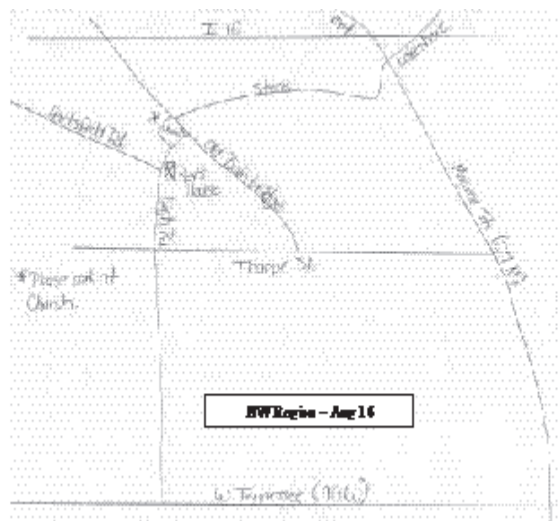

There will be coffee, juice, donuts, etc. in the morning. Cold drinks and water will be provided all day. Lunch served from 12:00pm - 1:00pm

As a shop, we specialize in sculptural metal work, mild steel, aluminum, cooper, bronze and stainless. We fabricate gates, rails, stairs, furniture, light fixtures, sculptures, and almost anything unusual and often one of a kind custom work. We have three propane forges, three power hammers, anvils, etc. In fabrication we often combine welding with traditional joinery, forging of aluminum, steel and bronze. We make parts on our lathe and mill every week.

There will be a quick shop tour and discussion about innovative ideas we find helpful for increased production. We'll discuss the differences between working with the various metals, their advantages and disadvantages. We will talk briefly about finishes, which is one of our specialties, and demonstrate a great antique bronze finish and a great finish on aluminum to look like natural wrought iron.

We will make a bird, palm leaf and other items using repousse tools and the pullmax as a forming tool on sheet metal and light plate. We will also demonstrate some custom dies on the power hammer for forging various shapes on steel as well as aluminum bar stock.

Our goal is to move quickly, have a lot of components partially made so you can see the steps involved, and have audience participation. If anyone wants to demonstrate something special, please give us a call and we'll allow time for this. Also, if there is anything particular you wish to see, let us know.

Steve Bloom:

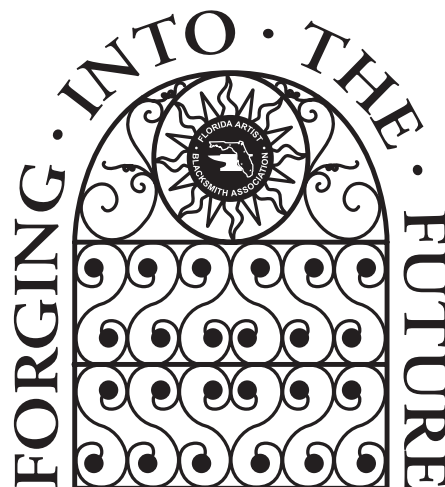
Our web master for FABA places the info I drop on him, plus he got up pictures of last years conference. Go to www.blacksmithing.org and look under conference.

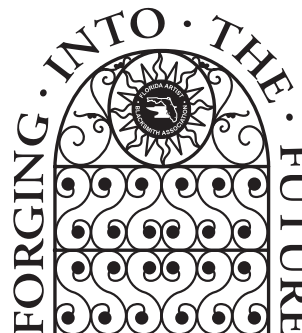

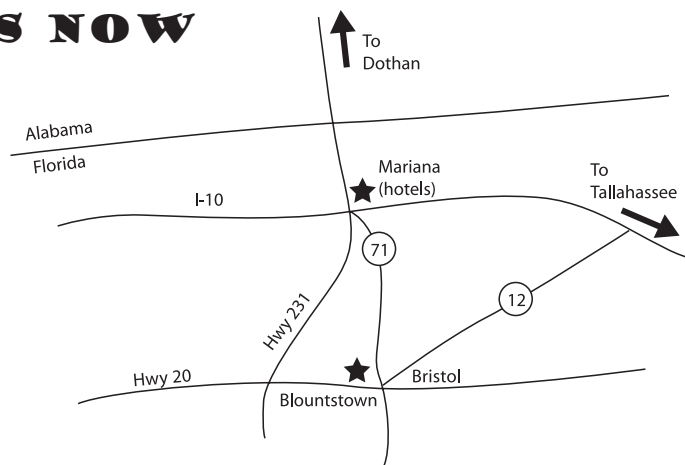

FABA COMMORATIVE GATE PROJECT - PROGRESS REPORT

Although we are making progress, the response to our request for the FABA members to make decorative disks for the gate has been less vigorous than we had hoped. We have some completed disks in hand, and more are promised soon. The problem we are facing is that of time.

It is our desire and plan to display the finished gate at the annual FABA conference in October. In order for that to be possible, we need to receive the individual disks from the members in time to get them welded to the gate, and then have it sandblasted and painted before transporting it to the conference.

We urge our members to contribute one or more completed disks to this project as soon as possible in order that we may have this project comfortably finished before October.

Let me again remind our contributors that the design is left up to the individual smith, and that we prefer that it be constructed all of iron (steel) since most other materials will require much time consuming masking for the sandblasting and painting. More details of the history of the gate, photos and disk dimensions can be found in my previous Clinker Breaker article. Finished disks can be given to your section coordinators, or sent to me or any FABA officer. Please contribute a little time and effort if you have not already done so. -*Joel Clark*

THE FABA GATE PROJECT

Project: construction of a decorative gate to be displayed at the October Conference and then installed at the Pioneer Art Settlement in Barberville.

At the top of the gate is located the FABA "sunburst" logo crafted by Rick Jay's artful hand and his plasma cutter. Toward the center of the gate are the initials "PAS" (Pioneer Art Settlement) which were cut from brass by Bill. The remainder of the gate is adorned with graceful scrolls and collars that were done at a NE regional meeting by various members. Space was reserved on the lower portion for 48 3 1/2" diameter steel disks, each to be decorated with a small forging designed and executed by the FABA member who contributed it.



The blanks should be 3 1/2" in diam. and 3/32 - 1/8" thick - about 12 gauge. The design is left up to the donor. It is suggested that the decorative piece be made from steel since the completed gate will need sand blasting and painting, and other materials would need to be masked and carefully protected. The range of possible designs is limited only by the constraints of the smith's imagination. Some of the submitted items have included such things as a miniature anvil, tiny tongs, an array of decorative twists in small bars, a wizard head, and an assortment of abstract designs.

“Tools and Tips”

TIPS FROM APPLECROSS FORGE

Tweaking and Adjusting:

How many times have you finished a project, put the finish on, and then realized that it really needs one more hammer blow or kink taken out? Hitting it with a hammer might scratch it or mar the finish though. Sometimes you can accomplish a final adjustment with a wooden hammer but this is usually not very effective on heavy stock. I have found that keeping scraps of leather handy will help. Leather will protect the finish from being scratched from hammer blows. Usually a piece of thick leather is only good for one or two blows however so be careful. Leather is also effective as a cushion when clamping your work in a vise. *-Bill Robertson-*
