

We are getting a blacksmith class starting with an organization called Project Lift, where they're helping some young people. That's what the four-burner forge is for, a great opportunity to help with.


Let me know if you want to get involved! I had to cancel our meeting this month because of family commitments: my mother-in-law is going to be 100! Wow! Be safe and keep building.

You read that right. We are going to be at a new location as we get a super special treat from a region member, Jimmy Morrissey. Jimmy is a professional Bladesmith who does mind-bogglingly complex pattern welds in his knives. Truly, I just stand in awe with my mouth wide open when looking at his work.

This month we will get to be instructed in many of the finer points in heat treatment. Once again we have an opportunity to learn deeply in a subject that our region simply hasn't had a teacher for in







a long time, so don't miss out on this chance.

The demonstration will be hyper focused on text book type knowledge of heat treatment. Bring your notepads and get ready to study. There will be many physical examples of



the heat treatment process going through its stages. There will also be examples of what can go wrong with explanations on how and why it went wrong and how to avoid it. Bringing a chair wouldn't be a bad idea.

Parking is going to be interesting. We simply do not have the space in front of the industrial shop to park our cars. The Far West has decided to produce for the October conference auction a tool chest inspired by the 1000+ year old Mästermyr chest found in a dry lakebed on the island of Gotland, Sweden.

Far West Members have previously signed up to produce various parts of the chest and at the start of this meeting the wood case for the chest was presented to the membership.

With this presentation as motivation, Far West members eagerly engaged on their chosen tasks. Jennifer Hay produced nails that will be used for final assembly and to hold the hinges/hasps in place. Christopher Mallet started work on the hinges. Billy Hay is making some of the tooling that will be in the chest when it goes up for auction.

The rune script on the front of the chest translates to "Strength through Challenge" followed by roman numerals for 2021 (Vikings did not use exact years





Our July 24th meeting will be under the shade of the pecan trees at <u>Butler's Countryside Farm</u>, 4112 <u>Bell Lane</u>, <u>Milton</u>, <u>FL 32571</u>, with focus on documenting your work for submission for the award of journeyman.

The August meeting will be hosted by Christopher Mallet at his house at <u>2331 Salamanca St.</u>, Navarre, FL, where we hope to dry run the "making a mini xiphos" class using cast aluminum.

September 25th, we will be back at Traditions Workshop to prep the trailer and equipment for the Ocala trip. Since we plan to be at the conference, we will skip our October meeting.

In November, we hope to meet again at <u>Timber Creek Distillery</u>. We don't usually meet in December but be on the lookout for a number of blacksmithing demonstration events throughout the fall and early winter.

Hardware for Restorations

The primary business of Traditions Workshop is the restoration of antique furniture, and while there are no markings on this smoke- and water-damaged pie safe, it appears similar to the "mail order" varieties once so popular in the late 19th and early 20th century and found in sales catalogs of such stores as Sears and Roebuck.

After cleaning the cabinet up and rebuilding the damaged parts, we had to solve the problem of broken bolts. Two of them in fact. They had been sheared off and missing them caused the case to be quite wobbly.

But where do you find 16 inch long 3/16 inch bolts with 10-24 thread? Well if you're a blacksmith, you make them!



We used the post vice as a bolt header. The original (lower bolt head) was a 16-inch-long carriage bolt.



Pushed through the case to get the correct length then cut and file smooth.



Anneal so cutting threads will be easier.



Cutting threads (yes, that is a copy of Clinker Breaker on the workbench in the background)



Ready to go back into service.
The middle bolt on each side was replaced.



Bolts are Installed and waiting for some 10-24 wing nuts to come in from Amazon.
