


Regional Events & Information

MORE FROM THE MONEY TREE

Thanks to Erin Harlow, our hard working hotel negotiator and grant writer, Alachua County has again shown how much they appreciate our 2023 event by giving us a grant for over \$3,000. We plan to pass those funds on to our 8 regional coordinators so they can improve your local programs.

Each coordinator is authorized to spend up to \$300 for local programing. These funds can be used to invite a special demonstrator or to build/purchase equipment. If your region elects to use funds for equipment (like building forges) please be sure to coordinate your plans with our Quartermaster – Kirk Sullens – so we don't have a duplication of efforts.

If your region wants to invite a demonstrator; the funds can be used to cover travel, lodging or a stipend. I recommend inviting one of our FABA members who has previously received a scholarship as this helps them complete their obligations for receiving those scholarships. Please DO NOT invite in an international demonstrator who will be awarded any of these funds, as this creates

immeasurable problems for us with taxes and regulations.

Regional coordinators who do not advise me of their plan to commit these funds by July 1st will have their allocation rolled over into the conference budget.

IGNORE YOUR SQUARE CANCELLATION

If you get a notice from Square that your account is cancelled, it is because when you renewed your account through our website, which is hosted by WIX, we have to cancel your account in Square or you will be billed twice each time you renew. We don't want anyone to be surprised. The Square cancellation is a good thing.

SW Region Meeting Report

At our January SW meeting, Trez and I demoed 'square corners' — again. It's a popular request as it's part of FABA's Journeyman requirements. It's fair to say that for me, square corners are tricky and have been my personal nemesis.

A few years ago, and after 4- or 5-years smithing, I was feeling that I had a good number of basic skills under my belt, so I decided to test myself with the target of completing the Journeyman list. Over many months I demoed my competency at the basics to Trez for signoff. Then I came up against square corners - not only in square bar but in round bar, (I thought the latter was a joke to catch me out, but no).

Just like we did at our recent meeting, I asked Trez to demo them.

I then began to try it out. It's hard! So, I watched videos by Black Bear Forge, Mark Aspery and ABANA. I understood a little more, but it is still hard. I made many mistakes, but I kept every one of my attempts and looked at what was




wrong and understood why. Now and then I would work with Doug Rogerson, who was also seeking his Journeyman last year, and we would try a few more times. Sometimes I made a good one and kept it as my own measure of my success. (See the picture here of some bad attempts and some passable ones).











Finally, I felt confident to demo my efforts to Trez and I just made it over the passing grade line. After a lot of work, I received my Journeyman certificate last year.

So, I made a couple more prior to our January meeting. This time I really thought about why I could do it the first time (it took me about 45 minutes and many heats).

Here is the learning advice I took to the meeting, which I think applies to all smithing techniques:

- 1) Look at what happened when you hit your stock. Where did the metal go?
 - 2) Do you need to correct anything?
 - 3) What are you going to do next?
 - 4) Repeat 1 through 3
 - 5) Be patient, be thoughtful

Also remember that you came to watch a demo from an experienced FABA smith who happily gave you his knowledge, (teaching is FABA's main goal). "If you put this knowledge on a shelf, you have to take it down sometimes and play with it, or it's not worth anything."

If you are in another region, ask a FABA Journeyman for a demo of square corners.

See in the pictures, the techniques I used at the meeting with a bottom die and a top swage, to demo the mysterious 'square corner in a round bar.'

It was great to see after the meeting that SW member Paul Wiedorn patiently worked on a square corner with a square bar and got his signoff in his Journeyman booklet from Trez. Thank you to all who attended!

Our SW March meeting will be on Saturday, March 23, at 10 AM, and we will be back to Crowley Museum and Nature Center just east of Sarasota.


